

It should be pointed out, however, that no official publication date is set for the third edition of the OED. Scholars have been working on the text since 1989, and as of June 2010 only entries from "A" to "Rococoesque" have been completed. The OED is widely considered to be the preeminent authority on the English language, and has been available in print since 1884. The set sells for about \$1300 on Amazon and weighs 137.72 pounds. While that may sound impressive, the entire text of the OED's second edition takes up just 540 megabytes of digital storage space. That means you would need just three-quarters the storage capacity of a typical blank CD to store all of the current OED's online offering. The Web version of the OED (launched in 2000) receives 2 million hits a month, while the complete OED has sold just 30,000 copies total since its publication in 1989, according to the AP. Access to the OED online doesn't require any heavy lifting. In December, the OED online Website will see its first major overhaul since the online lexicon launched in 2000. And that's a reality that OED acknowledges. In release notes announcing the updates, the dictionary says Nigerians "have made, and are continuing to make, a unique and distinctive contribution to English" through these words. The 29 new additions from Nigerian English, OED says, are "either borrowings from Nigerian languages, or unique Nigerian coinages" that have been used since the 1970s and 1980s. For example, "Tokunbo", a Yoruba name often given to a child born in a foreign land, became a popular tag used for secondhand cars imported into the country as new car sales crashed in the 1980s' economic downturn. And the informal language has proven durable as it is now spoken by millions in Nigeria—and across West Africa—as an alternative to English. It has also become the language of choice for international media looking to boost their reach in the region. But despite growing international recognition, Nigerian English still faces some acceptance hurdles back home. For instance, Tubosun believes teachers in Nigerian schools will likely frown at students incorporating Nigerian English phrases in examinations despite using those same words during teaching lessons. The hope however is that the inclusions in OED might signal a shift. "We need an educational system that is responsive to this," Tubosun says. "You don't have to keep depending on the old standard because the language has evolved and changed."
